Dear wife
and children

I sit down to write a few
Lines to ye Hoping it will
find ye in good health —

I main to Inform you
that I have been Sick this
two weeks and is not able
to do my Duty but now I
this day is much better than
usual I got a bad cold and
in a count of way of sleeping
we have here it turned in
to a p plouray but with
the help of god I will
get over it and if I am
not getting better next week
I will try to get home

Dear wife you must
Excuse me for sending
you such a small sum
as ten dollars which
you can get as you
got it before by delivering
this receipt. I would send
~~40~~ more but for fear I
would not ^{get} better that
I should get a furlow
to go home than I would
want it. Let Patrick
know that I got his letter
last week and being so
sick that I was not
able to write but with
the help of god I will
be able to write to him
next week Give my Love
to Father and all the
Family and remember me
to the children no more
At present Michael Lally

I recd your Letter
as before

Let me now is
James Sullivan in Roxbury
or was he the two children
with him I was drawing
of them a few nights ago
